See What All the Hoopla's About!

Beginning August 1st, Bullitt County Public Library cardholders can instantly explore, borrow, and enjoy even more dynamic content on their smartphones, tablets, and computers with Hoopla!

A unique digital entertainment and media service, Hoopla allows you to easily borrow movies, music, e-books, and audiobooks from your browser. The service provides access to thousands of titles anytime, anywhere you have an internet connection, or you can download titles to your mobile device for offline access. Even better, there are NO HOLD LISTS, so you can always check out and enjoy Hoopla titles right away.

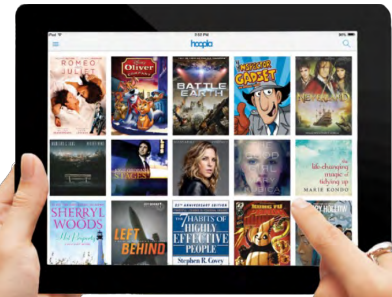
We think Hoopla is the perfect complement to the e-media services we already offer, such as Kentucky Libraries Unbound/OverDrive and OneClickdigital. Hoopla's e-book and audiobook selection is different from the titles offered by KLU or OneClickdigital, so if the title you want isn't available from one service, chances are you will find it in another. (And if you ever can't find a title you

are looking for, please let us know!)

Hoopla offers an especially strong collection of comics, manga, and graphic novels. And the music—ranging from popular new releases to nostalgic favorites—is something not available from any of our other online services. The selection encompasses a wide variation of musical tastes, including 2016 releases ranging from Blake Shelton to Drake to Paul McCartney to the *Finding Dory* soundtrack.

This new service will work on all four major browsers, or it can be used on Apple iOS 6.0+, 7" and 8.9" Kindle Fire HDX, or Android devices. To access Hoopla content on your tablet or smartphone, you'll need to first download the free Hoopla Digital app from the App Store on your device. With the right equipment, you can even watch Hoopla videos at home on your TV!

It's easy to create your free Hoopla account. You'll just need to choose your library system; provide your e-mail address, library card number, and PIN; and create a password. If you need help getting started or have questions, just ask for help at a library service desk!

- ⇒ BCPL cardholders may check out up to 12 items from Hoopla each month. Monthly checkouts reset on the first day of every month.
- ⇒ You can stream or download Hoopla's content on compatible iOS, Android, or Kindle devices with the free app. PCs and Macs have streaming-only access.
- ⇒ There are no hold lists and no fines or fees. Content simply stops working at the end of the checkout period.
- ⇒ Checkout periods are as follows:
 - ⇒ **Audiobooks:** 21 days
 - ⇒ **E-books & Comics:** 21 days
 - ⇒ **Movies & TV:** 3 days*
 - ⇒ **Music:** 7 days

From the Director

August is here, so not only is it National Goat Cheese Month and National Panini Month (my apologies to those with food allergies), it is National Back to School Month and Get Ready for Kindergarten Month. We here at Bullitt County Public Library have been making some changes to our Children's section in order to help your little ones develop the early literacy skills that will not only get them ready for kindergarten but also build a foundation for success in school and, hopefully, throughout their entire lives as well.

The building blocks of literacy and language are said to form in the first three years of a child's life. Reading to or with a child helps form connections

within the brain that are key to understanding how printed words work, to building a vocabulary, and for increasing general knowledge. It is important to build and develop the process of reading before kindergarten so children are not only able to read before the first day of school but are also prepared to learn.

It is essential to start early because these literacy skills are harder to devel-

op at a later age. A study by Jim Athanassou determined that literacy at age 10 is a predictor of both education and vocational achievement in one's early 20s,

“One in six children who are not reading proficiently in third grade do not graduate from high school on time...”

while Donald Hernandez found that “one in six children who are not reading proficiently in third grade do not graduate from high school on time, a rate four times greater than that for proficient readers.”

In order to make it easier to find the materials right for your child, we have worked on dividing the books that we had classified as children's books into more distinct categories: Board Books, Picture Books, Beginning Readers, and Chapter Books. More detailed descriptions can be found in the article on the opposite page. Each of these new collections simplifies the process of finding age-appropriate books that will spark the interest of your child, whether you have a baby, a toddler, or a preschooler.

So, we encourage parents with young children to pick out some books from our collection and spend some time reading with your children. It boosts cognitive and emotional development in children, improves oral language skills, and leads to success in reading and other academic areas later on!

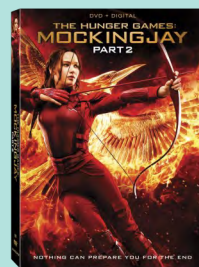

Library News

New Collections @ All BCPL Locations



The new Chapter Book collection in the children's section at Ridgway Memorial Library.

If you frequent the children's section at the library, you may have noticed a few changes lately. In order to make our library system more user-friendly and purpose-based, we've created several new collections so that kids and parents can more easily locate the books that best fit each child's reading and interest levels.

Children's book categories now include:

Board Books

This collection consists of books with sturdy, laminated cardboard pages. Selected especially for babies and toddlers, this format is important in introducing books to the youngest child. These books generally have bright, uncluttered drawings or photographs and are wordless or accompanied by very brief text.

Picture Books

Along with board books, picture books are often the child's first introduction to books. They are usually written for pre-readers and beginning readers and are typically shared with the child by an adult. However, some picture books are intended for older, primary-school-aged children and feature more involved stories and higher reading levels.

Illustrations play an essential role in picture books; their purpose is to extend and interpret the story, supplying what paragraphs of words

in a novel do for older readers. Our collection includes both wordless picture books and standard picture books where the words and pictures are meant to work in tandem to tell the story.

Beginning Readers

As the name indicates, these books are written for beginning readers. Children learn to read at different ages, but usually between five and eight, they begin to decode words and start to read by themselves without adult help. Beginning reader books use a controlled vocabulary to help children practice the new skill of reading while limiting their frustration level. These books often have large print, generous white space and margins, color illustrations, and fairly simple stories. We purchase beginning reader books at a variety of reading levels so that children can continue to develop their skills and vocabulary as they work their way up from short sentences with only a few words on a page to longer paragraphs and slightly more involved stories.

Chapter Books

Chapter books are targeted to more advanced early readers who have the attention span and skills to transition from heavily-illustrated beginning readers to longer, more detailed stories. Chapter books usually feature one or more illustrations per chapter, but pictures are of minor importance to the story. Popular early chapter book series found in this collection include Amber Brown, Cam Jansen, Geronimo Stilton, Judy Moody, June B. Jones, Magic Treehouse, and Rainbow Magic. Chapter book readers are usually in the early primary grades; around 3rd grade, many children will be ready to begin exploring the more detailed stories included in our juvenile fiction collection, but they may still enjoy titles from both collections.

Children's Nonfiction

Our children's nonfiction collection includes real-life stories and informational books for children up to early or middle primary grades.

As students head back to school, don't forget about the many resources available from BCPL for students of all ages. Educators can even set up an appointment with our Reference Department for an overview of the many services and materials we offer to supplement their curriculum or to help with professional development and planning (see page 6 for details!).

Both nonfiction picture books and beginning reader books have been included to meet the needs of children at a variety of reading levels and attention spans.

While the new collections are nearly complete at some library locations, we are still in the early stages at other branch locations. For example, Mt. Washington has been focusing on their juvenile fiction and new young adult (YA) fiction collections. These collections are intended to create a better division between middle-grade fiction (roughly for ages 8–12 or grades 3–6) and teen fiction (ages 12–18 or grades 7–12). Our Ridgway Memorial, Hillview, and Lebanon Junction locations will also be separating out these collections soon.

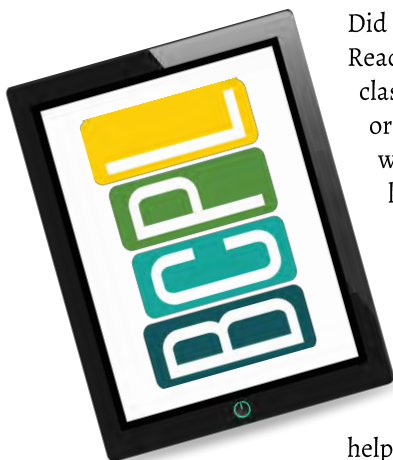

Calling All Educators... Are You Ready to Hack the Library?



Did you know our staff will create Personalized Reading Lists to help the reluctant readers in your classroom find books that actually interest them or that you can schedule book talks or coding workshops with a BCPL librarian? The Library Welcomes Pokémon GO Trainers



BCPL's Ridgway Memorial, Lebanon Junction, and Mt. Washington Libraries are all PokéStops, and a Gym is located at our Hillview location!

For the uninitiated, Pokémon GO is essentially a scavenger hunt for magical creatures played on your smartphone but in real places—like the library!

Players are called Trainers and are on a mission to catch all of 133 different miniature monsters known as Pokémon. The creatures are captured by swiping the screen of your mobile device to “throw” the animated Poké ball and capture the Pokémon you find on your hunt.

Along the way, there are real-world places called PokéStops, where you can virtually collect supplies like more Poké balls, and Gyms, where you can engage in virtual battles with other players. These GPS-based sites were selected by the game developers and are often places of historic or cultural significance in their areas.

Each BCPL location is either a Stop or a Gym, and Trainers are welcome to come play. If you are interested in learning more about Pokémon GO, FAQs & Tips sheets are available at all library service desks.

TECH TIP: View BCPL Holdings Across the Web

Did you know that there is a free Chrome extension called **Library Extension** that allows you to instantly view library book and e-book availability while you're searching other websites?

After a quick set-up (just install the extension and select your library system), this nifty little browser add-on allows you to view library book and e-book holdings directly within websites like Amazon, Barnes & Noble, Goodreads, and AR BookFinder. The extension even links directly from the

third-party website to the library catalog, so you can view the detailed catalog entry or place a hold right then! The top button links to the full online catalog while the second button directs users to the library's e-book holdings in OverDrive.

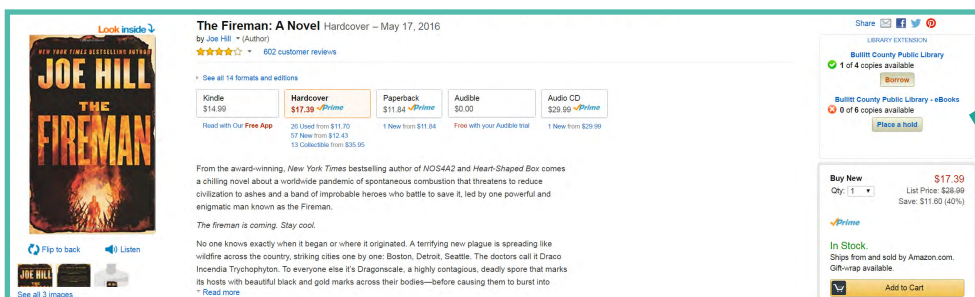
The extension currently supports over 1,200 libraries—including BCPL! It uses title and author to find matches within the selected library catalog(s), though unfortunately it does not check for audiobooks, movies, or CDs. We've

tested the extension and found it to be reasonably accurate, although sometimes there are incorrect keyword matches.

But if you are a frequent visitor to Amazon, Goodreads, or one of the other compatible websites, the extension is a convenient time saver. If you install the extension, you won't have to leave the site to check library holdings separately or try to remember to check later. You may even save some money by discovering that a book you are considering purchasing is availa-

ble for free from the library! And if you're concerned about privacy, no worries: the extension does not track your browsing history.

So far, the extension is only available for Chrome, but there are plans to release a Firefox extension sometime in the future. To get started or to find out more, visit the developer's website at www.libraryextension.com
