Recent BCPL Partnerships Bring New Opportunities to the Community

The Library strives to bring you the resources and opportunities you need to be the best version of you possible. This means providing the services you need to grow and enjoy life, within our walls and without. To this end, we explore partnership options to bring much-needed assistance in our community. Now we have exciting news regarding two partnerships beginning in March!

Due to the closure of the Bullitt County Kentucky Career Center, BCPL is partnering with KentuckianaWorks to offer career assistance to our patrons, regardless of where you are on your career path. Every week in March, April, and May, facilitators will hold outreach hours at all four library locations. They will offer one-on-one

services like customized career advice; resume optimization; suggestions to ramp up your interview skills; reading and math tutoring; and assistance navigating unemployment insurance. These services will complement and may be used in tandem with the resume and computer skills services already offered by BCPL's reference department.

KentuckianaWorks will also conduct a variety of workshops, covering topics like marketing, networking, and communicating professionally. Specialized resources for veterans and disabled applicants are also provided. Whether you're brand new to the work force, seeking a career change, or in need of specialized training for the job you desire,





Bullitt County Public Library (BCPL) has a long history, with an origin dating back to 1924 when the Bullitt County Woman's Club established the county's first public library. The Library's current structure dates back to 1967, when it was established as a taxing district with a petition signed by Bullitt County voters. This act set the Library up to operate under section 173.710 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS).

Under KRS 173.710, BCPL operates under a five-member, apolitical Board of Trustees, commonly called the library board. Trustees are not paid for their service; essentially, they are volunteers working to improve the quality of life and general welfare in the communities they serve.

The library board assumes legal responsibility for the Library as a whole, and also serves in these five primary roles:

- 1. Hire and evaluate the library director.
- 2. Monitor and evaluate the overall effectiveness of the library.
- 3. Plan for the future of the library in terms of finances, facilities, and services.
- 4. Set library policies.
- 5. Advocate for the library.

Board members serve four-year terms. Terms are staggered such that two member terms expire one year, two more expire the

second year, and the fifth term expires the third year; every fourth

year, no terms expire. Members may serve two consecutive full terms, after which they cannot succeed themselves. Any terms vacated before their end are considered unexpired terms, and the end date of the term remains the same. Any person filling an unexpired term may still serve two full terms after the unexpired term

The process for filling a board vacancy is as follows:

- 1. For each vacancy, the board selects two individuals committed to the provision of library service.
- 2. Names are submitted to the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA) for approval.
- 3. The state librarian and commissioner approves the names and sends recommendations to the local county judge/executive.
- 4. The county judge/executive, with the approval of the Fiscal Court, appoints one of the two provided names to either a full term of four years or the remainder of an unexpired term.
- 5. The newly appointed trustee takes the Oath of Office before the county judge/executive or other judicial officer.

Trustees [work to] improve the quality of life and general welfare in the communities they serve.

> Libraries were created to serve the entire community with free and open access to ideas and expressions, and the current appointment process keeps the focus on service above politics and has done so for fifty years. In addition to the oversight of KDLA and the Fiscal Court, there are dozens of statutes and regulations governing every aspect of library function. Library trustees are dedicated to upholding the law and have a demonstrated commitment to the highest level of transparency. Library board meetings are subject to Kentucky's Open Meetings laws and financial reports are submitted to the Kentucky Department for Local Government.

> Along with all their other duties, library trustees work hardest to represent their fellow taxpayers. Trustees reflect the community, mirroring the make-up of the local population. As taxpayers themselves, they strive to provide the highest service possible in the most cost-effective manner possible. If serving your community as a library trustee interests you, please get in touch with me. It's a great chance to make a brighter future for Bullitt County!
