

Stay Calm and SummerQuest On



Homemade Homegrown Fest Celebrates Local Creativity

Summer abounds with a variety of outdoor festivals, farmers' markets, and opportunities to get out and about as a community to celebrate the season and some of our favorite things—music, crafts, food, etc. At BCPL, we've created Homemade Homegrown Fest to give Bullitt Countians an opportunity to explore and enjoy some of the hidden gems that their community has to offer.

"There is an abundance of talented people around our community, and I wanted to provide a supportive environment for local farmers and artisans to display and sell their wares," said event organizer Stephanie Simmons of Hillview Branch Library.

Designed to celebrate all things (hand) made and grown, Homemade Homegrown Fest allows vendors to share their

creativity and passions with each other and their community while visitors can browse and shop local items ranging from hand-painted signs and artwork to thread crafts, clothing, jewelry, pottery, furniture, bath and body items, plants, and even homemade jellies and salsas. Various local food carts have also participated, including JW Moody's Munch Wagon, which will again be selling beefalo burgers and all-beef hot dogs at the upcoming Homemade Homegrown Fest on July 20th.

"So far the feedback has been very positive," said Simmons, "even those patrons who just come to browse love seeing the variety that this festival offers and the great relationships that are created here."



From the Director

A Quick Primer on Information Literacy

I'm guessing the following scenario has happened to everyone at some point: you receive a chain e-mail (usually with ten different fonts), or a family member posts a meme on social media and you know for sure that the information being presented has no basis in reality. How in the world did your friend/uncle/coworker fall for whatever faulty content it was that caught their eye? Well, it comes down to a thing called Information Literacy, and like all types of literacy it is a skill that can be learned by, and taught to, anyone.

The basics—Information literacy is the set of skills required to identify, retrieve, organize, and analyze information. Retrieving any old information is pretty easy; retrieving trustworthy information is hard. It used to be that printed information usually came from trusted sources, but literally anyone can publish something on the Internet or create a meme saying whatever they want and put it on Facebook. While it is still important to consider the source of the information, it is far more important to be able to evaluate the claims within. Analyzing or fact checking the content of source material for fraudulence or truth is key; just because a story or statistic sounds like it is coming from an authoritative source does not in any way mean that it's true.

So where does one start to find out the truth? If you are lucky, then someone credible has already done the research for you. For all things political, check out politifact.com, factcheck.org, opensecrets.org, or the Washington Post Fact Checker. If you want to do research on the bias of a political post, check out AllSides.com and view left, right, and center leaning articles from a variety of sources. For other topics, check snopes.com or truthorfiction.com, both of which cover a variety of topics from general news to viral posts and images.

If you cannot find anything to verify a dubious claim on one of those sites, the next step is to fol-

low the claim "upstream," or find its source. You can do this by following the trail of citations. Did it come from a satirical news site, like *The Onion*? Probably not a credible source. Did it come from a study? Find out if the study was done independently or sponsored by a company looking for a particular outcome. Get close to the original source of information so that you have a better chance to assess its reliability.

If you do find that a claim is false, be polite in pointing out the real facts and share your sources. Everyone has found a factoid that helped drive a point home, and most of us are so happy that we confirmed our point of view that we didn't do the research to make sure that the information was real. As loud as the world is right now I'd like to believe that the truth still matters, and verifying it just takes a few extra steps. 



DID YOU KNOW...? There's an App for That!

Over the past year, we've been working hard on technological improvements to make your Bullitt County Public Library experience more convenient and accessible than ever.

One of the first advancements we made was the addition of **mobile printing** at all BCPL locations. You can now send print jobs to any BCPL Print Release Station from your mobile device or even from your home computer. Print jobs can be sent via e-mail, from the PrinterOn website, or using the PrinterOn app. For more details or step-by-step instructions, please visit our

website or ask a library staff member.

Perhaps even better than mobile printing, in April we unveiled our new **Bullitt County Public Library app!** The app is available in your app store for iOS or Android devices.

Not only does the app provide quick access to all your mobile printing options, you can also use the app to search, renew, and place holds on library materials. You can even

check, renew, and manage your digital materials from Hoopla and Kentucky Libraries Unbound right in the app! Plus, easily access other digital resources in one convenient place or scan the ISBN barcode on any book to see if BCPL owns a copy.

The PrinterOn app allows you to easily send your print job to any BCPL location—any time, from anywhere. Print jobs must be retrieved during regular library hours within 72 hours of submission.
